
"Let the Sea Be Shaken and the Fullness Thereof!"

Today, our Savior, to Whom God the Father bears witness and Who is confirmed by the Holy Spirit, undertakes, as the Head of creation, to guide it to its true calling, that is, to freedom and deification in the Uncreated Light of the Holy Trinity.

Today, therefore, "Let the sea be shaken and the fullness there-of," "let the rivers clap their hands"!²

Let the sea be roiled and shaken and let it leap for joy. Let the lakes, the fountains of water, and all sea creatures be vibrant with exultation. Let all of the rivers applaud together in jubilation with their swift currents.

Yes, indeed, amid all-embracing and universal joy, creation is renewed by the Father, through the Son, in the Holy Spirit. And at the same time, Christ, the Archetype of man, begins His ministry, His

"work." He becomes an "example" for us as He journeys towards His voluntary Passion.

The Lord "no longer calleth us servants," for "He hath remembered His mercy." He has remembered His promise concerning mercy, compassion, Grace, love, and tenderness, in becoming the Good Shepherd and, as well, the Lamb that takes away the sin of the world.

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Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ:

This year, we are celebrating the joyous Feast of the Holy Theophany at an historic turning- point that involves a national crisis and an impasse in our society: the State and its citizens, the rulers and the ruled, are coming into conflict with each other—a relationship which leads, day by day, to a deadly polarization.

• "It is time for the Lord to act." Our Orthodox ethos is an inexhaustible wellspring for strength and vision, for inspiration and action. Let us not despair; let us not opt for violence.

Taking inspiration from the Great Servant of humanity, our Savior Christ, let us make it our immediate priority to rediscover our human dignity in Christ, disregard of which, at a personal and a social level, has brought us to this crisis and impasse.

It is now an opportune time for us to become more profoundly aware that we are called "each to bear the other's burden, in life and in death"; to see, in the person of the other, God, Who is poor and homeless, destitute, an émigré, defenseless and pregnable; and to offer our hand, not just extend it, "with natural, direct tenderness," with a feeling of loving-kindness and self-sacrifice.
